Being Prepared and Fast Action Saves Life at WMFC


Over the past 19 years, WMFC Aquatic Director and Safety Officer Renee Allen has trained hundreds of West Midland Family Center (WMFC) employees. As an American Red Cross, American Safety and Health Institute and American Heart Association Instructor Allen trains and certifies staff in CPR/AED, First Aid, Lifeguarding and emergency responsiveness. Allen never could have imagined the crucial role those trainings would play this past fall.

"The AED and having the 911 dispatcher on speaker phone were invaluable and made all the difference in the eventual outcome. Without the AED, I'm not sure if Duane would have survived," stated Allen. "Safety and being prepared is a priority at WMFC. We constantly practice our Emergency Action Plans and that day it really paid off. I'm thankful for, and so very proud of, my WMFC coworkers. 


