

Helen's first opportunity in collaborating a volunteer activity came as part of Chemical Cares Day. The group started their day by spreading 50 cubic yards of mulch (a full semi-truck load) over two playgrounds. Later in the day they helped take down and put away the protective screens covering the outdoor swimming pool fences. They rounded out their day by adding to, and leveling out, the wood chips on the WMFC nature trails.

"Chemical Bank Employees, have volunteered at WMFC on Columbus Day for the past eight years," explained Roth. "They are a wonderful



me. The childcare staff is very open and honest about the care that my son receives and about his daily schedule and needs."

WMFC believes that close communication between parent and staff is vital. Parents at WMFC are encouraged to observe, discuss policies, make suggestions and volunteer in the classroom.

WMFC teachers foster learning and creativity in each child by offering age appropriate activities, materials and toys focused on the physical, social, intellectual and emotional development of each child. Children are provided a healthy balance between indoor and outdoor play, active and quite time, group and individual play. WMFC staff members understand that children learn as they play. Classrooms are set up so that children can initiate play on their own terms. Children are free to explore, learn, and grow.

"Knowing that the staff have the proper education and training to care for Bentley makes me more comfortable having him here," stated Rowell.

WMFC is a licensed childcare program that uses a discipline model called **Conscious Discipline.** "The Conscious Discipline Model teaches our staff how to integrate social-emotional learning, discipline and self-regulation into their

classroom environments so that they spend less time policing children's behavior and more time teaching the children vital life skills", explained WMFC Childcare Director Jillian Westphal.

"WMFC Childcare isn't just a childcare," continued Rowell, "the staff members truly have each child's best interest at heart and take pride in their roles as childcare providers. I love that the WMFC Childcare is part of a family center and that all the staff is friendly and welcoming to both children and parents," concluded Rowell.
